CRAB China, 18th century Jade

A Chinese scholar of the Ming or Qing dynasty would design a studio where he could study and practise calligraphy. This jade brush washer in the form of a crab was used to remove excess ink from a brush while writing or painting.


## **MEET THE CRAB**


Crabs walk sideways.
In Chinese literature, bullies
were compared with crabs
because their way of moving
was thought to be "stubborn".

Educated men and women in China were expected to do calligraphy (that is, write beautifully). This would show that they had inner depth. This crab-shaped brush washer was an important tool in Chinese calligraphy.
